Welcome to the summer edition of Kew News. We're very glad to have you with us!

As the weather is starting to heat up, the level of activity at the Museum is reaching boiling point! This newsletter is packed with all sorts of goings on, the biggest and potentially most impactful of which is the potential Great Engine House Project. Most of my time, and that of the team, over the last few months has been spent preparing a massive bid to the Arts Council for the project, which, if successful, would invest a total of £2.84 million in one of our most important historic buildings! There's more about what this could achieve within the pages but just to say I'm very excited that it gives us the chance to do something I've wanted to do since I joined the Museum a year ago – see our massive 90" engine in steam! You have all been brilliant at doing your bit to help in donating to our dedicated crowdfunder campaign so we can demonstrate our commitment to the funder. Being able to meet a match funding quota of 10% is critical to winning a bid like this and we are so close to the £256,000 we have to raise.

There's also a warm introduction to all our new team members – and I must say I have been so impressed with how every one of our new team has pulled together to achieve so much activity and positivity for LMWS. We have got real ambition (it's even one of our team values!) and we hope you enjoy seeing that come to fruition!

Crowdfunder Update

We're over two-thirds of the way through our Crowdfunder appeal – thank you to all those who have donated and shared our appeal so far! We have reached 35% (£17,720) of our £50,000 target and have just over two weeks left to get to the finish line.

Our Challenge

Our proposed project will conserve our historic engines, the 90 Inch and 100 Inch, and the Grade 1 listed Great Engine House building. As well as returning the building to a watertight condition, removing damaging past repairs, and reducing carbon emissions, the project will be the first step in returning the 90 Inch to steam.

We are at an advanced stage of receiving a funding grant for the entire project of £2.8 million, BUT one of the conditions of the funding grant is to show widespread public support to save the museum – so we have set a target of raising an initial £50,000 by the middle of August. If we can raise the £50,000, we are much more likely to receive the remaining £2.8 million.

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Collections Highlight

Holly Slater

As the new Collections Officer at the museum, I am responsible for managing our exhibits and creating narratives from them. At first glance this item from our collection – The Metropolis Water Bill 1871 – looks rather banal. It is a revision of the 1851 bill of the same name and contains the minutes from the select committee that cross examined water inspectors and chemists who specialised in the filtration of London Water's systems.


It contains the, at times contentious, cross-examination of Mr E Frankland, Professor of Chemistry at The Royal School of Mines by Serjant Sargood. Professor Frankland describes the miserable state of London water as it he states that it has "a brown sherry colour...with a distinctive colour and taste".


Like today, the cleanliness of water supply was a hot topic to Londoners in Victorian Britain. The bill stemmed from public discontent about the state and management of London's water systems. The most prominent of these was the 1827 pamphlet called The Dolphin, which was written by a disgruntled customer. This pamphlet was so popular that it catapulted the issue of water management into the public psyche.

In 1851 the prominent industrialist Sir Benjamin Hall described how the water that was supplied to London "frequently became tainted with the smell of decaying animal and vegetable matter and had a slightly putrescent small and taste" and even, different (often unidentifiable) creatures were located in the water.

Reading further into the bill, it provides us with contradictory and often divisive opinions about the efficiency of London plumbers. One cross examination exchange:

where the barrister cross examining asks: 'You gave the London plumbers a bad character' - 'Yes'





'They are very bad, are they not?' - 'Yes, very bad. I have heard elsewhere that there is a habit in metropolitan plumbers to be very bad, because the Edinburgh ones are very bad.'

This ordinary looking book in fact provides us with a deep insight into the relationship between Londoners and the water companies, and how these companies had to acquiesce to the demands of the consumer. The bill confirmed the powers of the existing water companies and prevented competition by amalgamating companies. Consequently this meant that companies were not allowed to charge more than a fixed charge of 5 per cent.



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Happy Gotcha Day to Piper!




It has been officially a year since Piper joined the museum as Chief Mouser!


